College entrance exam to be held Nov. 18



The Education Ministry (교육부) said the Korean college entrance exam "suneung" for this year will be held on Nov. 18.

The state-administered exam was originally scheduled to take place on Nov. 11.

But the ministry *reset the test date because of the *overlapping of the date of the G20 summit in Korea.

The G20 summit is a very important diplomatic event. Presidents or prime ministers from 20 advanced and powerful countries in the world will gather on Nov. 11 in Seoul to discuss global economy.

This is the second time that the annual College Scholastic Aptitude Test has been rescheduled. In 2005, the test was also delayed *due to the nation's hosting of the APEC forum in Busan. ㉠

Nepalese teenage likely to be world's shortest man

An 18-year-old Nepalese traveled a long distance to be recognized as the world's shortest man.

Khagendra Thapa Magar, whose height is 56 cm, went to Europe with his father to appear on TV programs and to *promote himself as the shortest man. He wants to be added in the Guinness Book of World Records.

Magar held a press conference on Feb. 20 and *claimed himself to be the world's shortest man.

Magar stopped growing when he was 11 years old but doctors have failed to find out the reason why his growth has stopped. ㉠

Seodaemun Prison to be restored



Work to restore the Seodaemun Prison in western Seoul is under way. The project started to mark the 100th anniversary of Japan's *annexation of Korea.

The prison, which was constructed in 1908, was where Korean independence fighters were tortured and killed during the 1910-1945 colonial period. It had been used as a *correctional facility until 1987. In 1992, a historical park opened on the site.

Seoul City plans to restore a set of facilities, including a *security division building, a *cookhouse and the former prison cell of Ryu Gwan-sun, a renowned female independence fighter, who died in 1920 at age 18 after being tortured in the prison.

Inside the security division building, a historical exhibition hall will be established. The hall will showcase the history of independence movements with an array of items, including prison uniforms and punishment tools.

Construction for the hall will begin in April or May and finish

by the Aug. 15 Liberation Day.

Construction to restore the cookhouse will begin in March. *Caldrons and other cooking tools used at the prison will be on display there.

Restoration work for the underground cell where Ryu was kept will begin within the year. Work to restore the cell will *proceed based on photographs of the prison taken in the 1930s.

Restoration work for the isolated exercise yards will also begin this year. Each of them was separated with walls, allowing a single prisoner to exercise.

"Marking the 100th anniversary of Japan's annexation of Korea, we will make the prison a site for history education to *vividly showcase this sad part of our history," said a city official. 📢

History of Seodaemun Prison

The "Seodaemun Prison" is a major site of *oppression and *torture during Japan's *forced colonization of Korea (1910-1945).

The prison was first opened on Oct. 21, 1908 under the name of "Gyeongseong Gamok."

But Japan changed the name into "Seodaemun Prison (Hyeongmuso)" in 1923 and *imprisoned and tortured the Korean *patriots in the prison.

The prison could *accommodate a total of 500 *inmates.

After the *liberalization from Japan's rule in 1945, the prison has served as a *detention house.

In 1992, the government established the "Seodaemun Independence Park" to honor the late *independence

fighters. The Seodaemun Prison became part of the special park.

In 1995, the government remodeled the prison into the "Seodaemun Prison History Museum" to *pay tribute to the spirit of the nation's patriotic ancestors. The patriots bravely devoted their lives to resisting the Japanese harsh rule, despite imprisonment.

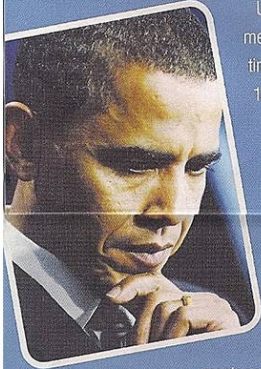
In the museum, there are seven *jail cells, a historical exhibition hall, a torture room and watchtowers.

There is also a basement jail cell in the museum. Independence fighter Ryu Gwan-sun died there. 📍

Obama meets the Dalai Lama



U.S. President Barack Obama met the Dalai Lama for the first time at the White House on Feb. 18.

The Dalai Lama is Tibet's famous *spiritual leader. He is well known to the world for his *human rights activities.

But unlike other diplomatic events, the Washington meeting was very *low-key.

There were no welcome fanfare, no public comments and no official *declarations.

The two leaders only gave a brief statement through the White House spokesman after the meeting.

This was because Obama reportedly wanted to avoid irritating China.

The Chinese government had called on Obama not to meet the Tibetan leader. Chinese leaders and officials had warned that the meeting could hurt U.S.-China relations.

China has responded very sensitively to Tibetan problems.

Tibet is not a country but a Chinese *Autonomous region. Tibetan people seek independence or greater autonomy, and China is *vehemently opposed to the move.

Chinese officials have criticized the Dalai Lama for trying to *split the nation. So, the Chinese government reacts angrily to

any country hosting the Tibetan leader.

After the controversial meeting between the Dalai Lama and Obama, the White House spokesman released a brief statement and just one photo.

According to the statement, Obama expressed *sympathy for the Dalai Lama's efforts to give Tibetans more rights.

Obama and the Dalai Lama are both Nobel Peace prize winners.

Obama told the Dalai Lama that he backs the preservation of Tibet's culture and supports human rights for its people.

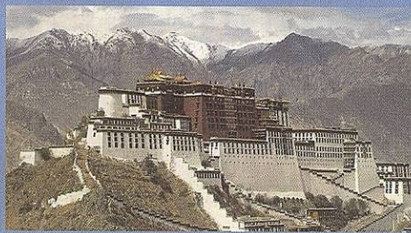
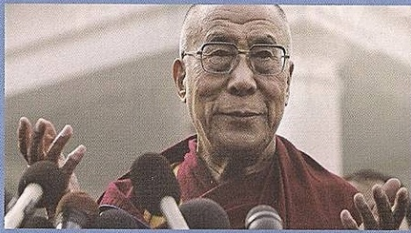
After the meeting, the Dalai Lama *chided the Chinese government for taking a "childish" and "limited" approach to Tibet's *quest for greater autonomy, according to the AP report.

The Chinese Foreign Ministry *summoned U.S. Ambassador to Beijing Jon Huntsman on Feb. 19 to protest the Obama-Dalai Lama meeting.

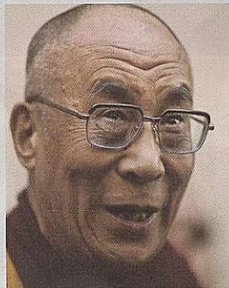

Who is the Dalai Lama?

The Dalai Lama, 75, was born fifth of 16 children to a farming family in a Tibetan village in 1935.

In 1950, he was *enthroned officially as the Dalai Lama at the age of 15. "Dalai" means great and "Lama" refers to Buddhist teachers.



He is the 14th Dalai Lama.

He became the region's most important spiritual leader and political ruler.

But the Chinese army *invaded Tibet in 1950 and put the

region under China's control.

The Dalai Lama led an *uprising against China in 1959, but the *struggle failed.

Then he fled his homeland to India and established a *government-in-exile.

For half a century, the Dalai Lama has stood for *nonviolence in the Tibet people's struggle against Chinese rule. Politically he sought greater autonomy, rather than *outright independence.

The 1989 Nobel Peace Prize was given to him for his consistent opposition to the use of violence and *advocacy of peaceful solutions to problems of the world.

He is not simply a religious or political leader, but is also considered a representative of human *conscience.

Kim Yu-na breaks world record



Korean figure skater and strong gold medal favorite Kim Yu-na scored a record high 78.50 points in the women's figure skating short program at the Vancouver Winter Games on Feb. 24 (Korean time).

The reigning world champion took the lead, edging out archrival Mao Asada of Japan by 4.72 points.

Kim broke her own personal best and world record of 76.28 set at Skate America in November last year.

After her brilliant performance, she said, "I am so happy that I finished the short program perfectly as I practiced."

She was scheduled to perform in the figure program on Feb. 26. She was expected to win her first gold medal in figure skating. But The Junior Herald could not include the final results in this edition because of the printing time. ①

Korea rising as *powerhouse in winter sports



South Korea is emerging as a powerhouse in winter sports. The country has performed better than expected during the Vancouver 2010 Winter Olympics.

As of Feb. 24, South Korea won 10 medals – five golds, four silvers and one bronze. In particular, the nation's short-track skaters dominated the Olympic Games. Lee Jung-su, a 21-year-old rookie, has already secured two golds in Vancouver.

South Korea has cut a fine figure in short-track race since

the Olympics introduced the event in 1992. South Korea has so far won a total of 34 medals in Winter Olympics as of Feb. 23. In the past, South Korea won medals mainly from the short-track competition. But now, the nation is expanding its power to the long speed skating.

The South Korean skaters have won three golds and two silvers in long track. Lee Seung-hoon won a silver in the men's 5,000 meter and Mo Tae-bum did even better, earning a gold in the 500 meter and a silver in 1,000 meter.

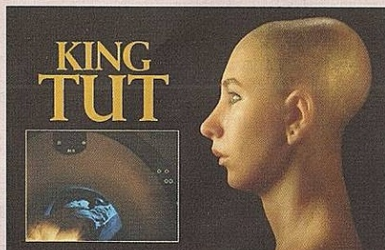
Inspired by their performances, Lee Sang-hwa won a surprise victory in the women's 500-meter race. And on Feb. 24, Lee Seung hoon won gold at the men's 10,000 meter speed skating. He claimed gold after his rival from Netherland was disqualified after finishing the race about four seconds faster than Lee. ②

The cause of King Tutankhamun's death unveiled



Egypt's most famous pharaoh, King Tutankhamun (1341 BC–1323 BC), was dead at the age of 19. But the exact cause of his death had not been known.

One of the most *plausible rumors surrounding the boy king's death was that he was murdered by somebody.

But a recent study said he was a weak boy who suffered from a *club foot.

The study said the boy king died of *complications from a broken leg worsened by malaria. The report was published in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

According to the study, scientists conducted two years of DNA testing and CT scans on Tut's 3,300-year-old *mummy.

The king was a minor ruler in ancient Egypt. But he became famous after his tomb was discovered in 1922. The tomb was filled with jewels and *artifacts, including a golden mask.



Tut became pharaoh at the age of 10 in 1333 BC. He ruled for just nine years at a *pivotal time in Egypt's history.

Speculation has long *swirled over his death at 19.

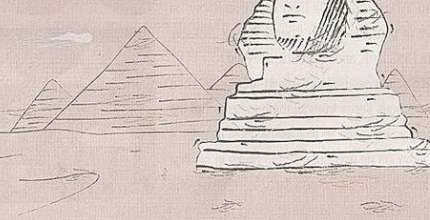
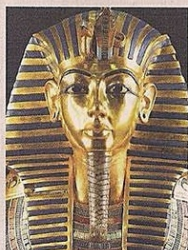
According to news reports, a hole in his *skull fueled speculation he was murdered. But a 2005 CT scan showed that the hole was likely from the *mummification process. The scan also uncovered the broken leg.

The newest tests indicate that the king's *immune system was likely weakened by *congenital diseases.

The study said the scientist team found DNA of the malaria *parasite in several of the mummies.

"A sudden leg *fracture possibly introduced by a fall might have resulted in a life threatening condition when a malaria infection occurred," the article said.

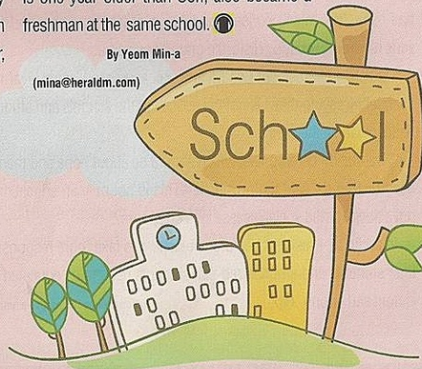


There are also celebrities who entered college long after they graduated from high school.

Nation concerned over violent graduation parties



Starting from early February, a series of photos and videos were released on the internet showing a group of middle and high school students engaging in violent graduation parties.

The first clip that *circulated online showed a bunch of middle school students ripping off each other's uniforms and spraying

ketchup to one another as part of their post-graduation *ritual.

Then, the latest set of photos released online involving a violent graduation ceremony in an Ilsan school, Gyeonggi Province, left the nation in greater shock. In the pictures, about 40 naked middle school boys and girls are piled up in a human pyramid after their graduation ceremony. These students were reportedly forced to take off their clothes and follow orders by their school seniors. The case is currently under investigation and certain students are facing *criminal charges.

The continual release of shocking photos and videos of young graduates has been *provoking concern and *disgust from netizens and adult citizens regarding today's *distorted graduation parties.

On Feb. 17, President Lee Myung-bak expressed regret over the latest scandal by saying that it is not the police but the schools and students who need to handle the case.

"Graduation ceremonies, which should be about hope and thanks, have been distorted," said the president. "This is not only an educational issue but a deep-rooted social disease in need of cure."

In addition, President Lee urged teachers to take more responsibility for their students and emphasized that students need to be educated on what is right and wrong. 📺

The mortarboard is a headwear that has an ornament called a "tassel" attached to it. The bundle of strings that hang down from the top of a mortarboard is a tassel.

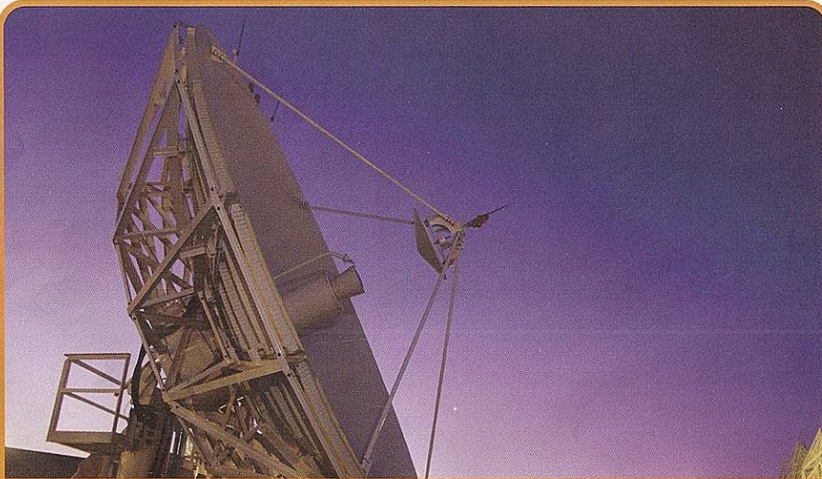
The gown is the mid-*calf length robe that is worn closed.

Problems with Vancouver Olympics broadcasting



The Vancouver 2010 Winter Olympics have become a hot issue these days. However, *controversy over the *rights of broadcasting is rising in Korea.

SBS is Korea's only television station with the broadcasting license on the Winter Olympic Games.

So Korea's two other main broadcasters – KBS and MBC

– were not able to broadcast any of the Games. I think this situation has a lot of problems.

Citizens' rights to watch the Games were largely ignored. Citizens have the rights to choose broadcasting networks they want. However, as SBS is the only broadcaster to show the Games, citizens could not *exercise their rights *properly.

SBS is a broadcasting company that only covers Seoul. In other words, people who live in places outside Seoul may not have the chance to see the Vancouver Olympics.

SBS could broadcast the Games in *cooperation with local broadcasting companies. But the deal could not be made due to differences among the broadcasters.

In conclusion, I think allowing only SBS to have the rights to broadcast is not a good idea.
